# ILLEGAL USE OF PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY (PRoW)/TRAILS BY MOTORISED VEHICLES



## Use Of Cornwall Council's On Line 'Report It' System

As trailed in previous articles, Chacewater Parish Council has been at the forefront of trying to address problems created by *a few thoughtless individuals* who illegally use motorised vehicles (2 and 4 wheeled) on our Footpaths, Bridleways, Restricted Byways and Heritage Trails. Not only do these *few individuals* do enormous harm to the countryside, disturb legal users and upset rural householders, they are often - unwittingly – doing harm to themselves because of the sort of surface erosion this sort of activity does cause in some of our old industrial mining sites.

Devon & Cornwall Police have now conducted two separate operations as a means of educating and hopefully preventing such activity as we move forward. However, they need our help to target such sites and we have worked with other Parishes, the Police and Cornwall Council to introduce a data logging facility on the Cornwall Council's own on line 'Report It' system, the link to which is: <a href="https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/report-it/">https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/report-it/</a>.

This part of the 'Report It' facility (to be found either under Environment or Roads and Parking) should be live by the

P.T.O.

time you read this article and basically asks the reporter to provide the following detail:

- Date, Time and Location of the illegal activity
- The Number of individuals involved
- The Type(s) of vehicles involved
- What was actually happening

All you do then is press Submit

No personal details will be required because this is basically a data collation tool to help the Police identify targeted 'hot spots' where they might run their next Operation and by so doing make best use of their scarce resources.

So, the message is, use Cornwall Council's on line 'Report It' system to help us all to use our public green and open spaces in the way they are intended.



Some Chacewater lost their lives while serving in the armed forces during the First World War. Their graves lie in Africa, in Asia and across Europe. Many joined up locally or elsewhere in **England**. Others came back from Australia, from South Africa or North America.

#### IN MEMORIAM

Pte. Herbert Stanley **BEHENNA** - Devonshire Regt. (2<sup>nd</sup> Bn.) **Died 31 July 1917** 

In 1896 Herbert Stanley BEHENNA was born in Creegbrawse, where his forebears had lived and toiled for many generations in nearby mineworkings. His great-grandfather, William, was a copper miner. His grandfather, Thomas Behenna, started mine work at the age of 11; as did his father, also Thomas, who was born at Wheal Henry in 1867.

Herbert was the eldest surviving child of Eliza Reed Behenna and her husband Thomas, then a mine captain. Shortly after Herbert's 1st birthday, in March 1897 his father's younger brother Frederick died in Arizona, U.S.A. By the time he was 5 years old, Herbert had a younger sister, Hilda Mary, and two brothers. His first brother (born 1899) was named Frederick John Behenna. Young Thomas Sidney was born early in 1901. The family lived on Cox Hill and prospered.

Herbert Stanley continued to study as teenager but, aged 18, he was among thousands who volunteered to fight during the weeks after war was declared in August 1914. He joined the regular army Devonshire Regiment and underwent training in the U.K. throughout 1915. Partial military records show Pte. H.S. Behenna (27615) served with the Devonshires 1st Battalion and later he was posted to the 2nd Battalion. Both units had lost hundreds of men in actions on the Western Front.

Herbert Behenna went to France in 1916 with replacement troops. After months in the trenches at Ypres, the 1st Bn. regrouped at Arras and moved to hold the line on the Somme in August and September. Later, the 1st Bn. returned to Arras and again suffered heavy losses in assaults along the Vimy ridge during Spring 1917.

Meanwhile, the 2nd Bn. Devonshires were badly mauled near Albert on 1st July 1916. The unit was rebuilt and fought in the final battles of the Somme in October/November. They tracked the German retreat in March 1917 and then moved north to prepare for the next offensive at Ypres. This began, the third battle of Ypres, on 31st July 1917. Pte. Herbert Stanley Behenna was with the 2nd Bn. Devonshire Regt. when they attacked Pilkem ridge in the early morning. 21 year-old Herbert was lost with hundreds of his fellow soldiers on that day.

The 2nd Bn. stayed in the battle until they reached Passchendaele village 4 months later. On 1st Sept. the army reported Pte. H. S. Behenna 27615 "Wounded"; then "Wounded and Missing" on 4th Oct. Finally, on 22nd Dec. he was reported "Died of Wounds". In fact, Herbert Stanley was never identified and he has no known grave. His name is commemorated on the Menin Gate at Ypres and on the Chacewater War Memorial.

After the war, Herbert's parents received a bronze "death plaque" in recognition of his sacrifice\*. His sister, Hilda Mary, married Arthur Douce and his brother Frederick John formed a trading partnership with Mr Douce and ran an agricultural business on Cox Hill for 40 years. Hilda's son, Thomas Henry Douce established the successful local firm of T.H. Douce & Sons.

# <u>A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ADRIAN - FRUITS OF THE</u> SPIRIT.

#### Part 8. Self Control

Welcome to the last part, entitled 'Self-control' in my series of eight reflections on Galatians 5 verses 22- 23 called *The Fruits of the Spirit*. This character trait is something I wish I had more of and I try my best to teach myself a little more self-control. Usually, when provoked, I try counting from 1 to 10 slowly before I open my mouth saying something or doing something I may regret. Recently though, during lock-down we have all had to learn many new skills such as; safe 2m distancing, queuing outside shops by the black and yellow tape and some have even become teachers to home-school their children! Coping with all of this recent difficulty during this dreadful virus pandemic takes great self-control, patience and discipline because sometimes it may feel like the whole world is against us, testing and tempting us to make careless or incorrect life decisions.

Jesus spent forty days alone in the wilderness and despite the devious worldly temptations set before him he exhibited perfect self-control. Matt 4:1-11. Jesus kept close to his heart the word of God, 'the Scriptures;' quoting verses confidently to keep control and triumph over three major temptations and stay purely focused upon God. We can do the same because when we are full of God's word we are secure in our identity and this helps us to recognise lies when we hear them.

Regularly reading God's word found in the bible means we just can't help over-flowing with the love of God to those around us, building them up and encouraging them too. With God's word in our hearts we cannot help being changed from the inside out. The more we see the parts of our lives we need to change (such as increased selfcontrol) the more we understand what is needed in order that we may become more like Jesus. So, pick up a bible and read yourself not just some self-control but some of each of our fruits of the Spirit; love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness and gentleness.

I have really enjoyed writing this series on 'fruits of the spirit,' I hope you have enjoyed reading them too and in the next issue we will move on to a new series on the Parables of Jesus. Until we meet again, may I take this opportunity, along with everyone at the Three Valley Methodist Churches, to wish you and your family every blessing and may the Peace of God be with you now and always.

Hope you are all well during these strange times. Like everything else, ViB has been affected by lockdown, but those of us who can have been doing some works around the village.

Work on the Car Park bank (Church Hill bank) continues. We have planted a "Rose of Sharon" bush which is currently sporting lovely yellow flowers. Joining it is a purple Heuchera plant. Also, you may notice a Rosemary bush which looks like it's having a nap! We rescued it from another plot where it was hidden under bushes. We are hoping it will soon perk up in its new home.

We have added some foxgloves, cranesbill geraniums and ox-eye daisies which will give a nice display next spring/summer. Also, some essential tidying of overhanging tree branches has been done. Removing brambles from the bank and wall is ongoing and it's already making a difference.



# VILLAGE **PONDWATCH**

June 2020





water star-wort now lie 10 cm below the surface where pondskaters spread their legs. Whirligig beetles and water boatmen move in squadrons across the open water while two palmate newts drift above the weed. One displays paddle feet as it moves away and the other burrows into a hole in the weed mass. A diving beetle the size of a coffee bean wobbles through the water. She rests briefly to breathe at the surface then continues her journey across the green mat.

Around the pond, yellow flag iris plants stand tall and slender spearworts show yellow flowers at the water's edge. Sparrows scour the hedgerow for insects and keep checking stalks emerging from the pond. When long days of sunshine in May and early June made the pond shrink, many more birds came to drink. A large crow often stands on a lily-pad island to find food and water.

In the warmer water great diving beetle larvae hang with breathing tails at the surface before they swim back to the bottom. A water stick insect swims at the fringe of a weed bank and ducks under cover. Another one wades in the silt and swims swiftly into a forest of stalks. Last year's juvenile grass snake has grown now to more than 1 metre long. She swims through the floating leaves in early evenings, patrolling the pond from end to end.

Winged hunters fill the heated air. A broad bodied chaser dragonfly darts up 4 metres into the tree canopy, descends to make a rapid circuit of the pond and comes to rest on a reed stem. The dragonfly dodges a sparrow that tries to ambush him. A pair of speckled wood butterflies spiral into the trees and then fly across the pond where a red tailed bumble bee cruises among the plants.

Back in the water, newts rise frequently and drift in the sunshine. A frog croaks in a far corner.
