WHAT HAVE "THEY" BEEN UP TO? Chacewater Parish Council Update

The New Millennium Green Pathway.

Many residents will be aware of the massive effort put in – over just one week in late November - to install a new 95 by 2 metre wide pathway up the side of the Millennium Green. Not necessarily planned to coincide with National Road Safety week (16th to 22nd November 2020), the fact that it did certainly resonated with many residents, especially most of the parents and pupils who use Church Hill to access our Primary School. All were hugely grateful to the small

volunteer group who made this their absolute priority for the month. These works stemmed from the very real Road Safety concerns expressed by our Headteacher, Mr Chris Gould, parents and residents.

So, discussions were held, decisions made, letters written, funding secured and materials sought – all in record time - to deliver a plan that our volunteer manager of the Millennium Green, Mr Paul Shevlin, had devised earlier in the year, for the betterment of all concerned. In pictorial terms, the process was as follows:





This work required some very long days of hard manual labour, invention and initiative but the location was lovely, and the appreciation shown by parents and children alike was most welcome.

All in all, this was a true Community project which has gone a long way to addressing a potentially serious issues on Church Hill, particularly at school start and finish times. We cannot be complacent though and be lulled into thinking this will resolve all of the road safety issues on Church Hill. So, the Parish Council and School continue to work together (and with other outside authorities) to do more, the new Car Park perhaps being the most significant and obvious long-term objective.

SOME GOOD NEWS

On the topic of the new Car Park and drop off zone above the school, we have received some really good news just as we finished the pathway. After a very long wait, and passing through several hoops, the Parish Council has now received planning permission to build both the Car Park and the Community Garden above the school, on fields we will be renting from Tregothnan Estates. It is hoped work can start just as soon as possible and be completed by Easter. As most of the work takes place off the road, it is hoped that we will be able to undertake the work with the minimum of disruption to the everyday comings and goings at the school.

FLOOD PREVENTION

As Chacewater village sits in two valleys, there is clear potential for rain waters to collect in areas we don't want them. It is therefore imperative that our drains and roadsides are kept clear or leaf and silt build up - some given our treelined challenge. landscape! Everyone has a part to play in preventing such activity here and so if any householder has a drain or live alongside an area where even the slightest blockage or silt build up can occur, they are encouraged to keep it as clear of unwanted debris as is conveniently possible.

From a wider perspective, we do get a lot of help from Biffa, with whom we have a running contract to sweep certain roadsides around the Parish, as and when requested and this has been hugely effective throughout the past Autumnal period in particular.

Mr Northey does much work of this type, most recently by trimming the hedge on both sides of Church Hill, leading up to the Primary School. Cormac have come along in recent weeks to reinstate some of roadside grips and cleaned out several key drains. Finally, we will be embarking on the annual Leat clearance work in early January. Volunteers very welcome (see events notice).

In short, by working together we can beat what can have a potentially devastating effect on some householders and so please do your bit if you can and it is safe to do so. Many thanks.

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY (PRoW)

Our new PRoW contractor, Mr Richard Ward, is still working extremely hard to get our much-loved footpaths, bridleways and byways to a more acceptable standard and we thank him for his resilience and dedication in pursuit of this goal.

Unfortunately, we have also seen or heard a good deal of unwanted illegal activity along some of our PRoW routes by 2 and 4 wheeled motorised off-road vehicles in recent times. which have caused untold damage in many places. It is imperative that we tackle this activity NOW and so any one who sees this sort of Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) is strongly encouraged to report it via the online Cornwall Council 'Report It' system, the which link to is: https://www.cornwall.gov.uk/environ ment-and-

planning/countryside/public-rights-ofway/report-motorised-vehicles-onpublic-rights-of-way/

An extremely easy to use and totally anonymous system (just 6 bits to fill in and not your name or contact details) that will help Devon & Cornwall Police to build up a picture of potential "hot

spots" of such activity, which could ultimately lead to prosecution, please, please, please don't hold back on this issue because this is most important – the Parish Council cannot do this alone and these are our Public Rights of Way!

What your Parish Council can do, however, is to report and press for remedial action to observed defects along our PRoW and this month has seen some welcome works undertaken by the Cormac Environmental Team to:

- Repair the wooden bridge across the Carnon River at Riverside.
- Repair/re-direct potential flood waters to Silver Bridleway 71/1 above Willow Bridge Cottage from the Bissoe Road area.
- Temporary surface repairs to Silver Footpath 70/1 near Wheal Prosper, ahead of hoped for more permanent solutions at some point later in 2021.

Again, you can use the online 'Report It' system to report any defect to our PRoW but if not able then contact the Parish Clerk who will re-direct your concerns via the most appropriate route.



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COULD YOU DO WITH SOME HELP OR EVEN JUST A CHAT?



M For many, the Christmas and New Year period is a time of fun, good fayre and togetherness. However, the

festive period can also leave many with feelings of despair, loneliness and a general sense of vulnerability; none of which are necessarily linked to poverty or deprivation, although these contributory can be factors. Throughout the Covid19 crisis, similar to many other parishes, Chacewater reached out to the vulnerable to offer support, ranging from: supermarket shopping and medical collections/deliveries, to Post Office runs and short errands.

This worked extremely well, but there is a sense that we could perhaps do more in terms of support at this key time of the year, especially for those amongst us who might feel the need for the occasional chat over the phone, at the gate or over the fence or those who are seeking a bit of company whilst out on a walk - basically anything that can potentially lift spirits on an otherwise dreary day. 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BISSOE COMMUNITY WOODLAND



Cornwall Council is encouraging new woodland areas across the county

and has several pockets of 'Closed Landfill' available. Cornwall's target is to have tree canopies covering over 2% (approx.8000Ha) of the county. Kea and Feock Parish Councils have been offered some 1½ acres close to the Bissoe Trail to create new woodland for community use and welcome other volunteers including any from Chacewater and Gwennap join in.

Presently, this site is overgrown, reclaimed waste-land with a covering of soil, scrub and rough grass. A field gate onto the road is not suitable for regular use. It is envisaged that new pedestrian access will be made, complete with new pathways, fencing and hedgerows, direct from the Bissoe Trail. The aim is to create an easily-managed community woodland with fruit, nut, berry and other native trees; including small picnic areas and perhaps an open play area.

Forest4Cornwall can supply packs saplings that will need planting and nurturing. This will also encourage

people to get outdoors and meet up safely socially distanced. The encouragement of wildlife will also be a key feature.

The site will undergo a basic land survey, a lease agreement will be made and then ideas and designs will be sought. We have been offered mechanical assistance with a tractor and other equipment to re-establish the boundaries.

For now, this project is just an outline on a map and very much in its infancy, but we want to gauge the level of possible support at this stage. Are you interested in playing a part in creating this future legacy? Thank you

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VILLAGE PONDWATCH + GREENWATCH


DECEMBER 2020

In brambles at the water margin a little flock of goldfinches sparkles bright vellow, red and black. Blue tits and sparrows also visit to forage among pondside plants.


Higher up in the Millennium Green a squirrel romps beneath the trees and a Jay flashes pale pink and white feathers when it flies across the new footpath.

CHACEWATER RIGHTS OF WAY (CROW) WALKING GROUP

SUNDAY 6TH DECEMBER 2020

Dressed for the worst of weather, as is so often the case, the clouds lifted and the sun came as we assembled at the Square Car Park for the last CRoW Group trek of 2020, on Sunday the 6th December 2020. It was good job that we had those wellies though because conditions under foot were quite messy in places, the consistent rain having finally taken its toll on many footpaths, bridleways and byways some of which had also clearly worsened by illegal off-road activity!

So, with bright bonnets, a cheery outlook and damp but increasingly warming morning ahead of us, we moved off, up and along Church Hill with an energetic younger element taking the lead. We nipped off route slightly at first though, so we could see how the fabulous new pathway in the Millennium Green was settling down (wonderfully well is the answer) and paused at the top opposite the school to advise on the state of play regarding the latest on the plans for the new Car Park and Community Garden, which have finally been granted - Winner!

Noting the good roadside grip and drain clearance works near Chacewater House as we went, we headed off right at 90 degrees about 150 metres on up the Hill onto Silver Byway 51/1 which, after a further 100 metres or so, connects nicely with the,

currently quite muddv. Silver Bridleway 51/2 and even muddier Bridleway 52/1. With wonderful surrounding countryside now revealing itself and a good few interested horses to chat to, we passed High View Farm on the left before eventually emerging out near the Creegbrawse Crossing, where we took advantage of a well-appointed puddle to wash off our footwear. We turned right and rambled for about half a mile along the lovely lane towards Cox Hill, just opposite Truro Tractors - what a view this lane does offer across to the left in particular.

Crossing what would ordinarily be one of the busiest of our Parish roads, it is worth saying that we hadn't actually met a moving vehicle until this point and, even then we didn't see one which was really quite astonishing! We took the safe route through the Truro Tractors vard to the right (part of Gold Bridleway 13/1) in order to link with Silver Byway 54/1 down towards Salem Cottage, at which point we turned up left again on Silver Byway 55/2. Out onto the road leading to Todpool (if you turned left), we went right and immediately took in the majestic Killifreth Stamps Engine House. Over the Truro to Redruth road towards Wheal Busy (again, very few cars to be seen which was a joy to behold!) so we could chat at length about the potentially positive ways that this important incredibly area Outstanding Universal Value (OUV) might be taken forward in the years to come - more on this next month with anv luck.



Slightly cloudy but bright skies, the CRoW Walking Group pause in front of the Wheal Busy Mine Engine House. Famed for its unique 3 arched Lancashire Boiler rooms, Tregothnan Estates have also installed 4 beehives nearby.

Moving on, we kept the Wheal Busy Mine Engine House to our left and along towards transited Gold Bridleway 5/3, passing the Cornwall Observatory on the left. Things were getting muddy again by this stage and some little legs were getting a bit tired, so we headed back to the village via peculiarly sequenced the Bridleways 6/2, 6/4 and 6/3, which took us down onto the Wheal Busy Lane beside Hillside Farm.

Arriving at The Terrace and down Sergeants Hill, we got back to the car park a little later intended (at 1120), however, all agreed that it was well worth doing this particular walk, especially given the freshness of the morning weather.

The next CRoW walk will leave the Square Car Park at 0930 on Sunday the 3rd January 2021. As ever, all are welcome provided circumstances allow.

We all love stories, whether it be bedtime stories or stories around the kettle over a cup of tea. We all enjoy a good tale, yarn or story and Jesus told many and they are called parables. The parables that Jesus told describe what the Kingdom of Heaven is like, not just heaven the place, but heaven as a Kingdom with a real purpose. Jesus told parables to illustrate spiritual truth using everyday items and situations and I think the parables

have much to tell us about the way we live our lives today. For the first month of this New Year 2021 my choice is The Wise and Foolish Builders, found in Luke 6:46-49.
