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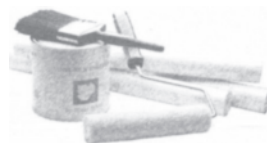

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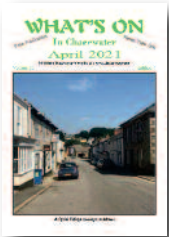

IN BRIEF

What a month March turned out to be, we have seen some return to what we

used to call "normal" with children going back to full time school. The sound of their playing at breaktime seems to awaken some of the usual rhythm of sounds that are life in the village. An increase in traffic is a bit of an antidote, but an inevitable consequence of daily routine slowly returning to pre Covid levels.

Around the Parish activity is stirring, a bit like spring. The Car Park and Community Garden by its sheer scale being the most impressive and noticeable. There are also less visible activities but no less in scale. One such, is an extensive survey of all our wonderful Public Rights of Way, with an aim to claim a grant, which would address more serious problems of the surfaces and infrastructure.

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HOME LEARNING TOP TIP!



This month has seen the return to school, "Wahool!", I hear parents cry! I hope that your children have settled in well and are enjoying seeing their friends again. My students have all been very tired this week so I can tell they have been having lots of fun.

This week's education golden nugget is **the humble dice**. It is cheap, easy and a very versatile resource that I use in many of my lessons.

Here are a few ways you can use it for learning at home:

Addition and subtraction - roll the dice two or more times and add or subtract the numbers.

Place value - Roll and create numbers using the digits for hundreds, tens and one or even bigger numbers!

Times tables - roll and multiply.

Division - pick a random number, roll the dice and divide the number by that digit.

Odds and evens - note how the previous division game will bring this into question.

Probability and data - roll a certain number of times and record the results then create a graph to show this.

Literacy and phonics games - roll the dice and associate the number with a word card or phonics sound to practice.

Chacewater Car Park – Re-lining and Maintenance

Public of Rights of Way (PROW)

We are currently undertaking a thorough review of all 17.5 miles of our Public Rights of Way (PRoW) with a view to prioritising works throughout the Summer/Autumn period, over and above our standard maintenance contract. In effect this will give us an opportunity to see if we can improve many of the surfaces of our Bridleways and Footpaths. Stay tuned!

Pavilion Toilet Block

Some volunteer works have been undertaken to improve the Toilet Block facilities adjacent to the Football Pavilion. Hopefully this will be the last

time this needs to be done before the new Multi-Sports Centre gets going.

Pot holes

We have reported many pot holes lately, in particular along High Street and Fore Street. Cornwall Council have responded to advise that the area will be completely resurfaced in the next financial year, so we ask that residents be patient for now as this is very good news indeed!

Recreation Ground – Vandalism / rubbish & Illegal activity

We are sorry to report that time after time, almost every weekend either our village operative or volunteers are having to spend a lot of time cleaning up the pavilion at the Recreation Ground. The area is constantly strewn in rubbish, glass bottles and illegal paraphernalia. The illegal activity is being reported to the police who WILL act providing that they can catch the culprits in action. **PLEASE** report any suspicious activity to the police as soon as you witness it by calling 999.

BISSOE WOODLAND PROJECT

Mid March update

Following a couple of lengthy sessions of shrub, bramble and nettle clearance by Ross and tractor, a large proportion of the available land has revealed some deep undulations and troughs. It is hoped to fill these pockets with reasonably good topsoil (from donations) over the coming months to make the growing area more accessible and amenable to planting sapling trees.

During the first week of March we were offered approximately 150 rooted mixed tree saplings comprising mainly oak & hazel for immediate planting, so have dug these in and secured with bamboo stakes complete with protective sleeves.

A GOOD WALK

With any luck, following government guidance, we will be able to reintroduce the first Chacewater Rights of Way (CRoW) walk of the year, albeit in "groups of 6", on Sunday 4th April. In the meantime, here is the last of the Chacewater walks taken from the **cornwalltrails.net** website (*see map & details online*). Follow the **No 1** orange arrows you see on posts, tree trunks, etc. along the way as you leave the car park. The shortest walk on the Trails website, but it includes many of the lovely features we may take for granted all around this wonderful place of ours.

CHACEWATER TRAIL 1 - THE MAIN SETTLEMENT LOOP

Short Description: This is an interesting historic landscape walk. Best described as moderate, but Chacewater village sits in a valley - so all ways out go uphill at first!

The Route. Trail No 1 takes you out of the village via Fore Street and Station Road (*beware the traffic can be busy at times!*) then off left up to the Terrace and right up North Hill. Take a moment here to turn round and view the surrounding landscapes. Keep going to the very top of this lengthy Byway (25/1), turn right at the top and right again. Go downhill and then move left behind Carley's Organic Foods - a modern business run with an almost zero carbon footprint.

Emerge onto Station Road and head



north (left). Take a left fork just before the magnificent 7-arched Blackwater viaduct, which replaced the original Brunel construction. Carry on up the rise, finding the old railway station to your right. You eventually turn left down Bridleway 62/1, which leads you out onto the awesome Great Wheal Busy Downs area.

Follow the Bridleway left (passing the "Observatory for Cornwall" site on the left) and turn right at the way marker post, to take in the magnificent views south and westward of this World Heritage Site (WHS) mining scene laid out before you.

Continue your trek down through the centre on this rugged track surrounded by capped mine shafts with the Engine House pool on the right. Arriving at a more defined Byway track, you turn left back towards the main village settlement, passing Hillside Farm before re-joining the Terrace. Turn down Buckingham Nip or Sergeants Hill and return to the car park along Chacewater's historic High and Fore Streets.

Just uphill from the car park, you may wish end your walk with a drink or picnic at the Millennium Village Green. Here you can observe bird life, absorb the scenery and read about John Robarts V.C. at his memorial stone, just inside the entrance. About 3 miles in all, this walk provides some insight into the topography of Chacewater Parish and just a glimpse of its heritage.

Accessibility

- Described as moderate, but stout walking boots are advised.
- It is Family/Child friendly, but a bit up and down and not so pram friendly. There are stretches of busy rural road, but mainly this is a route of discovery for the whole family to enjoy.

Hello from the Show

COMMUNITY GARDEN &

At long last, digging machines have started to prepare the ground for a new Car Park and Community Garden above the school on Church Hill.

Chacewater Parish Council has been talking to the landowner, Tregothnan Estates, for more than one year. The Parish Council also spent many months engaged with planning authorities to secure necessary permissions.

Now, we have the green light, as reported last month. In just a few days at the beginning of March, contractor T.H. Douce & Sons shifted tons of topsoil, turf, brambles and brushwood to clear the site. After pausing for bad weather, work has continued to terrace the hillside and level the lower part.

Many local residents have signed up already to be Community Gardeners and hope to start growing plants as soon as the landscaping work is done. A deep layer of topsoil returned to the terraces and

banks should provide fertile plots for a wide variety of crops.

A site visit on March 29th will let everyone see the shape of the land above the new car park and consider ways to develop and look after the Community Garden in the years ahead. The elevated position also offers great views over the village and across the valley. We look forward to making the garden a great space for all to relax and enjoy quiet recreation.

The car park will allow easy access to the garden for all. School staff and parents will have convenient off-road parking. It is designed by the Parish Council to enable car-driving parents to drop off and collect school children more safely by avoiding road jams and hazards on Church Hill. Also, it will provide vital extra spaces when needed for events at School, Church, Village Hall, Bowling Club, Recreation Ground or elsewhere in the village.

and exciting new assets for Chacewater. Remember, if you are willing to help work and look after the Garden, please contact the Chacewater Projects or the Parish Council Clerk [details at the back of "What's On"].

After many months (indeed Years!) of planning and searching for funding and following a tender process the Parish Council finally appointed a local contractor who has started landscaping work on the site above the Primary School off Church Hill. This work will produce a parking area for around 34 vehicles and the intention is to keep parking free of charge for users (similar to the main car park), however donation boxes will be placed to help fund future maintenance.

The community garden terraces will be organised into useable growing areas eg: flowers, fruit, salad and veg

growing and there will also be a near new large shed provided for basic storage use. This will all need to be managed so that the site reflects the overall look of a garden rather than a patchwork of plots. It is hoped that a small management committee can be gathered from the community to represent all interested parties, including the school. After all the hard work, this will be the easy bit! The Parish Council will retain overall responsibility.

At this point in time there is no provision for mains electricity, no mains water and no mains drainage on site. Rainwater harvesting will be strongly encouraged as will future renewable energy sources.

The pre-owned shed will require reconstruction just after Easter? and a Committee will need to be formed.

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VILLAGE PONDWATCH

MARCH 2021

Sharp frosts stripped the last leaves from the bramble thickets, just as Spring arrives. Tangled stems around the pond are bare, winter grey and brown.

Sparrows leave dark bulrushes ragged with white tufts where they pluck nesting down. A male Mallard duck rests on the water with iridescent green plumage on his head and dark blue bars on his wing feathers. As people approach, he takes off vertically and flies away up the valley.

Some newts flip from the surface and quickly dive into the weeds where snails graze along the stalks. A small square piece of bright green leaf thrusts forward as a caddis fly larva rolls its case through a dark mound of decaying leaves. In sunshine a palmate newt moves slowly over the leaf litter as it hunts across the bottom of the pond.



At the end of February, common toads bundle together under the starwort weed. Fewer toads than usual visited the pond this year. On 1st March they left a few strings of spawn wound through the matted weed.

In the water margin, two clumps of Marsh Marigold form yellow buds and large flowers open to greet the Spring.

1. "I'm too young."

If you are eighteen you are old enough.

2. "What's the point of just joining a talking shop, they don't do anything."

Have you ever been to a meeting? Basing your judgement on watching The Vicar of Dibley is definitely not valid. But it could be correct, come along and see for yourself.

3. "I haven't got any planning applications in at the moment."

Putting in for planning has got nothing to do with sitting on the council, whatever may have happened years ago. In fact, if your own application is discussed by the council, you must leave the room.

4. "I'm too busy, and couldn't commit to attending every single meeting".

Meetings are rarely more frequent than one (sometimes two) evenings a month, and missing the occasional one is perfectly acceptable. Most meetings only take a couple of hours.

5. "I'm concentrating on finding a job or furthering my career."

Being a local councillor is a definite plus point to add to a CV – it shows

you can make decisions, work in a team, are community minded and proactive. Prospective employers will be impressed.

6. "I haven't lived here very long and don't know the area well."

If you have lived or worked in the parish for a year, you are eligible. Your views as an 'incomer' should be welcomed, as you will probably see things more objectively.

7. "I'm worried that I won't get many votes, and look silly."

Even if you are not voted on this time, you may well be approached if a vacancy occurs in the future and have the opportunity to be co-opted to the council.

8. "Our parish council is full of old fogeys."

Join up and change it then.

9. "I'd look a fool because I won't know what's going on."

You will be eased in gently; there is help, advice and more formal training available. The clerk is the officer to the council, and she is the one who will explain the rules.

10. "I'll have to let everyone know all about my business and personal affairs."

The declaration of interest asks you to declare business interests within the parish area, to guard against bias when parish issues are debated. As for personal affairs, you live in a village, everyone knows about those already.

11. "I'm too lazy, and not interested in my community."

An excellent reason for not joining. This is not true because you would not be reading this if you were not interested in the community.

12. "I prefer to let others do the work, and then criticize from the sidelines afterwards".

Also a valid reason for not joining, but do bear in mind, that expounding your views in the pub, rather than the council chamber, will not change a thing in your parish.

FROM THE RURAL DEAN

We thought it worth updating you on plans for a new parish priest in our midst.

You might recall that the churches at Chacewater, St Day, Carharrack, Gwennap and Stithians are now operating as a single cluster called the Five Saints. Representatives of those congregations have been working hard over the winter to enable us to proceed to the next stage. Very significantly the individual Church Councils have now agreed to form one single Church Council over the next three years, which will oversee all the churches, and should streamline the administration a great deal. But we definitely want to go on celebrating the uniqueness of each congregation and their surrounding community, so the new structure will definitely allow

for each of the churches to express their individuality, while also being supported as part of a wider whole. The new structure will enable the joint PCC to concentrate more on the churches' mission – how we actually go about bringing good news to the communities we serve and, we pray, helping to make our communities better places to live.

We've now put together what's known as the Parish Profile document which describes the area we live in and our congregations, and also sets out the sort of person we're looking for to lead our churches. By the time you read this we expect that an advertisement will have been placed in the Church Times, and we're praying that the right person will see that and apply. Like any job, there will be a shortlisting and interview process, and all being well, there is a realistic chance that a new parish priest will be in place during the summer. That person will live in the Rectory at St Day.

All this represents quite a lot of change! I'm conscious that those of us in the Church of England don't necessarily embrace change all that readily. And at one level, some things about the Church are by definition timeless. Our God is always faithful and loving. The Bible speaks of Jesus Christ being the same yesterday, today and forever. But we only have to think of the pandemic of the last year to see that the world itself is full of change, and if we look at the Church over the centuries it too has changed beyond recognition since the days of the saints our churches and villages are named

for. In the same way, today our churches are facing the challenge of change so that we can be fit for purpose over the decades that follow.

If you find change difficult, it's worth remembering that change can also be wonderful! This time of the year brown hedges and drab gardens gradually begin to turn green, and spring bulbs and other flowers bring back colour and life, birds begin building nests and the circle of life goes on. The Church of God which stretches round the world, and through the ages, will outlast us all. My prayer is that our particular churches here can continue to be part of that worldwide Church of God, changing as we need to, but still being places and people who can joyfully point others to the love and saving grace of God, and work to make life better for everyone who lives in the communities each of them serves.

AN EASTER MESSAGE FROM PASTOR ADRIAN



I am overjoyed that we have arrived at Easter once more, it is one of my favourite times of the year: light evenings, family gatherings, the season of Spring

erupting in to life and a wide variety of marvellous food available for us to enjoy. As it is Easter, I will leave our usual parable reflections for this time to bring you a special Easter Message and we will return to our parable series in the May edition.

To begin with, I would like to ask, what are you looking for this coming Easter? In the bible reading *Luke 24:1-12*, the disciple women went looking for the tomb of Jesus in the Easter garden, but the tomb was empty. Time and time again the risen Jesus turns our expectations upside down and forces us to rethink our life plans and perspectives. And I think that begs another question, what is each of us expecting to find this Easter? If we look further into our Gospel reading we may find that we shall be rescued, revived and renewed by the unconditional love of God.

We are rescued by the love of God; as were the women in the garden. It was the faith of the women in their compassion for Jesus which lead them to the garden. Even though all

seemed hopeless they did not abandon Jesus, they came to the tomb mourning the loss of their teacher and friend. They needed to be rescued by God and we have all known similar times of pain in our own lives. Even today we may find ourselves in need. When we are in such times of need we should trust in God, and allow ourselves to be rescued by him.

Once rescued, you can clearly see the joy and the urgency of the women in the garden as their lives are transformed by the good news they have seen and heard. They experience a revival from despair to hope. When we place our trust in God there is also sense of personal revival for us. A real sense of rejoicing; we know we are not abandoned because God is with us. Easter Day is a fantastic day for us to be revived by God.

Finally, we return to the garden scene and walk with the women disciples from the empty tomb and its wonderful news. The women are renewed by this real encounter with God and the result is their witness for Jesus; their own personal testimony of him which is eagerly told to others. And our Easter renewal should have the same effect on us; one of amazement and excitement. There is a realisation within us of what God has done, in his great love for us, through his Son Jesus. Therefore, the joy of the women becomes our joy; their witness is now our witness. So, let our renewal be an inspiration to all of those around us, as we pass on the good news of

that first Easter Day in the garden.

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? Jesus is not here; He is risen!"

However you celebrate this Easter, I wish you, your family and friends every blessing and great joy and until we meet again, I wish you a very Happy Easter.

Dear Reader

One of the main concerns to report for this month is the question of the Rates. Every household must pay to Cornwall Council for the services that they render. As I write this our envelope from Cornwall Council has arrived with what we must contribute for the coming year.

On 23rd February after I had written the article for the March publication of What's On, Cornwall Council held a full council meeting and increased everyone's rates by 4.99% which on a Band D property equates to approximately £195. added to every household, all dependent on the actual Band of rates everyone's home is on. Needless to say, I am proud to say that I voted against the proposed increase which was passed on a very political vote and votes were recorded name by name of Cornwall Councils actual membership.

There are two very controversial issues

of planning enforcement that frustrate the Parish Council and myself. However, I am pleased to say that they are being addressed and I hope that I will be able to report more next month about how they are being dealt with and progress made to resolve the issues. Also I am dealing with a planning application at Scorrier Industrial Park that is also dragging on, in my opinion, too slowly.

Mr. Richie Northey pointed out to me that the white strips of the Belisha Crossing in Fore Streets are badly in need of repainting which I have asked to be done.

Whilst the vaccination programme is reaching out to more and more people and we thank the NHS and all the staff for the work that they have done in getting this done. Alone it does not fully protect us from still catching Covid and we all need to continue to be vigilant in following safe distancing, wearing face masks and washing our hands regularly. If this is done by us all, we hope that the Government's Roadway out of this pandemic will continue to be rolled out. It is good that we have the children now back into our schools.

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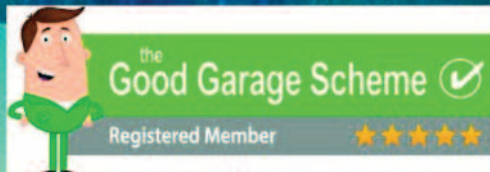
