We are looking forward to the next meeting and our Christmas party in December.


We would like to thank the Victoria Inn for all their help and never ending

This is basically just a friendly get together and people come and go as they please. It is one of the few things in life which is free and also easy, all you need is your mug and even that we can provide!



CROW WALK OCTOBER 2025

Much of Storm Amy had gone through the day before this, generally bright and fresh walk. We guessed we were in for a good one and so it turned out to be. Joined by three visitors who were taking a restful break in the area, and four very well behaved fourlegged furry friends (even the one who took the well chewed apple from the author's hand!), we started up Church Hill past the Millennium Green, School and St Paul's, in a southerly direction.

After a third of a mile, we arrived at St Michael's where we turned off left along the immaculately kept Bridleways 301/12/1 and 301/37/1, which eventually brought us out on the Creegbrawse Ridge Road behind Wheal Henry Farm. Having taken a

couple of breathers along the way (always required on Church Hill!), we took a short trek to the right for about 60 well-paced yards before picking up Bridleway 301/48/1, which swept us down left and around towards the Todpool area.

A bit narrow and uneven in places, this route brings the walker out onto a tarmac road (still a Bridleway, 301/48/2 in fact) and directly down into Todpool where it connects with the well signed Coast to Coast (C2C) Mineral Tramway. Pausing for a chat at the corner, we kept on the Tramway and headed right along and over the Todpool road crossing.

Soon, we arrived at a fork in the road (where this photo was taken) that takes the walker either further along the Tramway to the left or right up along the road towards Wheal Bush, which we opted for on this occasion



so we could pause to imagine what it must have been like in times of yore when the magnificent Wheal Unity Mine Engine Houses were being worked.

At this point we took a right up on Bridleway 301/13/2 which took us past a gloriously delicious apple tree before Cox Hill Farm and then onto Truro Tractors. Now well on our way back to the village, we took the safer of two routes on offer at this point and crossed over Cox Hill at the Bus Stop towards Church Hill once again. This is a narrow, quiet but lovely little road and we were making good time, so we took a left before the Creegbrawse Farm crossing along Bridleway 301/52/1, which then linked us with

Bridleways 301/51/2 and 3 to the right and eventually connected us with Byway 301/50/1. A couple more opportunities were taken to chat about local issues and initiatives before we emerged back onto Church Hill proper, just above Chacewater House.

Back in the main village car park by 11.15, but not before a timely briefing was given about the exploits of John Robarts VC at his memorial stone near the lower entrance to the Millennium Green. Everyone seemed to enjoy this adventure, which was good to see. The next CRoW walk will start out from the Main Car Park - as usual at 0930 - on Sunday the 2nd November.

The Harvey Sisters



Many thanks tο readers who have responded to our appeal for information about the Misses Harvey and the presentation plaque found at the Recreation Ground.

Mr Fred Dunne has

lent us a very interesting book: ("A Cornish Inheritance - The Harveys of Chacewater" written & published by David Gore in 1997.) which details the history of a wealthy and well-connected family who lived in Chacewater for more than 200 years.

The patriarchs were mining engineers and assayers who made their family fortune during the boom years of copper and tin mining in this area. The two unmarried sisters were the last of the Harveys of Chacewater – although some descendants now live in Australia and North America.

Harriet Emilia (**HE** – or Amelia, also known as "Milly") was baptised on 7^{th} Jan 1844. She died 19^{th} March 1944. Her younger sister **Ellen** (**E** – or Helen) was born October 1847 and died 5^{th} October 1941. They are commemorated along with their parents, Richard and Sophia, on the Harvey grave marker beside the Lychgate in St Paul's Churchyard.

The Harvey sisters lived on the Terrace in the family home, Buckingham House (now the Latchetts). They were private school teachers until the start of the 20^{th} century. Their older brother, Charles Harvey (1838 - 1930), was a successful mining engineer in the United States. He returned to Chacewater (in his mid-sixties, after their father died and his own marriage broke down) and lived at Buckingham House until his death 24^{th} March 1930.

Charles was a substantial benefactor for Chacewater village. David Gore records: "He donated a beautiful stained glass window to St Paul's church in memory of his parents, provided the village with a pavilion and other sports facilities on land given by Lord Falmouth, and, after a long-running disagreement with the vicar, gave him his car, a new two-seater Lagonda sports coupé, after the old man decided he had become a danger on the narrow Cornish roads."

It seems likely the cast-iron plaque of 1928 was attached to a bench on the Recreation Ground. It may have been lost when US army engineers levelled the ground during the Second World War.

Our Millennium Green has just marked its Silver Jubilee – officially opened 25 years ago on 10th September 2000 to celebrate the turn of the century. Dame Annette Penhaligon planted a commemorative Silver Birch tree to complete the opening ceremony. This was followed by a traditional Cornish tea treat enjoyed by a crowd of villagers.



The Green was created with support from the national Millennium Greens project and other national agencies, enabling local volunteers to transform an empty field into an accessible open park and leisure space for our community.

The Sylvanus Trust donated a number of native woodland trees and gave advice for planting the knee-high saplings uphill, beside

the southern and eastern boundary hedges. 25 years later, a wide

variety of mature provides trees woodland habitats wildlife and enjoyment for the community. Wild Cherry, Field Maple. Spindle, Hazel, Rowan, Oak, Whitebeam, Hornbeam, Sweet Chestnut. Black



Walnut, Aspen and Horse Chestnut join hedgerow sycamores, Holly, Ash and Hawthorn.

A large pond was excavated on the lower edge of the Green while heavy diggers were on site. Local volunteers worked to make it a natural haven for aquatic wildlife and the Fire Brigade helped to fill the pond – drawing water from the

Carnon river and pumping it through fire-hoses across the car park and



past the Village Hall. Today the pond attracts many visitors and is home for a rich mix of plants and animals.

The Millennium Green is a great venue for many public events, as well as for

quiet contemplation, relaxation or exercise. It's an open-air classroom, playground and parkland. A generation of schoolchildren has clambered into the specimen Beech tree that also gives shade in summer, alongside the Oak and Silver Birch.

An area of long grass and wildflowers beside the woodland margin gives cover for many small mammals. People pick blackberries but prefer to sit on the mown grass - as do rabbits, many birds, newts and insects.

The blend of woodland, hedgerows, a pond and open grassland offers many species living space which is sustained by nature and regular "light-touch" maintenance by volunteers. Regular users and responsible dog-walkers help to keep the park free of litter for the

benefit of all. Footpaths have to be kept clear of brambles and invasive weeds, trees are looked after and the grassland is tended throughout the year. These tasks are managed by a small band of volunteers in a few hours every month, but extra hands are always welcome!

Five years ago a new path was laid to make a traffic free route up Church Hill between the School and the Village Hall. At the same time, we built a Boules/Petangue pitch



behind the hedge at the top of the Green. At its Silver Jubilee, the Millennium Green is a proven and lasting asset for Chacewater.



Baldhu Messy and Forest Church

The theme for Messy Church was 'Being kind to all people', based on the story of Ruth 2 v1-9.

The Harvest table was still left up in the Chapel for the children to see.

The welcome craft was to paint an Autumn tree, then all were asked to build dens, which saw every single cushion in the Chapel being used!!! We had a wonderful time.

There were also friendship bracelets being made, pumpkin bird feeders where the seeds were cooked to go with our meal. We found a sheltered spot for our fire pit, to roast marshmallows on, then back into the den to create prayers to put on the tree painted earlier.





After watching the story of Ruth we shared pasta followed by jelly.

The next Messy and Forest Church is on the 1st November, from 2pm with the theme 'Peace and Light'.

There will be a Christmas 'stir-up' crafts and coffee morning on the 22nd November from 10:30am.

We will be joined by members of Camborne Brass for 'Carols around the Tree' on Sunday 30th November, the Carols start at 3pm, but there will be a Christingle workshop from 2pm. Followed by hot drinks and mince pies!

Giving Nature a Helping Hand

As the nights have been drawing in, we at Cornwall Branch of Butterfly Conservation have been planning our autumn/winter programme of habitat management, aimed at improving and connecting habitats to benefit biodiversity. This year we are visiting a variety of sites in the mining districts. People often ask me "Why are you cutting down Buddleia? Butterflies love it." Yes, they do, but caterpillars don't! It is a non-native invasive species that shades out our locally adapted wild flowers, which provide nectar for the butterflies and food for their caterpillars. One of the "special" butterflies on our mine sites is the Silver-studded Blue. They need a plant to lay eggs on near some "friendly" ants who live in symbiosis with them. Here they choose heather (mostly Ling, which is tolerant of the toxic minerals in the soils). They also need bare ground, which heats up when the sun shines, and something to nectar on which other wild flowers provide. The caterpillars are the eating machines and they can be very fussy!

So...Buddleia is fine in parks and

gardens but not welcome on our mine sites. We will never be able to get rid of it all, but take out some every year! Your garden will benefit by having single bloom flowers which bees and butterflies can nectar from, plants that fruit and flower all through the vear and a few of our native wild flowers. Even a patch of nettles will be useful, a variety of colourful butterflies, including Peacocks, lay their eggs on them, and don't forget No Mow May next year! For now though, it is worth reflecting on a fun afternoon that saw many of our young people just let their hair down after school, have fun in a safe environment and engage with those who can (hopefully) help deliver things in future.
